Farewell to the Hungarian Presidency – or “is there life after the Presidency?”

(There is definitely life for this blog after the Hungarian Presidency, as we will carry on blogging-and-teeing, so you are welcome to follow us.)

During the last six months the Presidency has fully occupied our days and part of our nights. A few presidencies had a rougher start than ours, but equally few have finished more successfully if we look at the actual achievements (we don't want to bore you with the details, you can read them [here](#) if interested). This spectacular comeback was based on the solid moral strength and the concentrated effort of our colleagues. Such concentrated effort can of course lead to addiction, which will unavoidably cause a few weeks of post-presidency depression. (Even though at the moment we can't wait to see our families in normal daylight and get our lives back.)

However what we are interested in this post is a wider question: is the presidency just a passing moment or does it serve a higher purpose? How did it change us personally and how did it change Hungary's role in the European Union?

In the new post-Lisbon institutional setup the rotating presidency is the last link that connects the Brussels Bubble to the Member States. And we must protect this role! The fact that the presidency rotates between Member States lends it great importance, but also creates its Achilles-heel: presidencies come and go and each one tries to reinvent the wheel again. This is why we tried to look at the incoming presidencies as a continuous flow and not as separate, conflicting or competing entities. We did our best to involve the Polish (and the Danish) communication team into our work and share all good and bad experiences honestly.



BadSign asked:

Do you think there will be debate, and possible action, on the Dublin II agreement.

The video of the question is [here](#) (from 04:45).

Ronny: Ronny Patz, [bloggingsportal.eu](#), are there still any major disagreements on the common asylum system, and did you talk about the Dublin II agreement issues?

Malmström: Well, yes, we haven't agreed on everything... and the aim was not to get a total agreement today, it was to identify the remaining difficulties and see how we can work further and Dublin is, of course, one of the most difficult issues to get an agreement on so, no, we have not agreed on that today. I hope that we will, eventually.

Yesterday was not, apparently, a day for making decisions. Away from the cameras, officials told us the Dublin II agreement was "stuck." There are apparently four points of contention in the Dublin II negotiations, and member-states can only find agreement with one of them. So, I wouldn't expect changes anytime soon.

We were also told that at least some of the ministers draw a distinction between "illegal economic migrants" and refugees coming from North Africa, which is something OneGonk and Philip had been talking about.

Summit footnote – the 'Monti effect'

So many laurels have been laid at Italian Prime Minister Mario Monti's door that he risks having an "Obama" done to him - being awarded the EU's equivalent of the Nobel Peace Prize simply for existing.

Well, say some, the effects of mere existence cannot be over-estimated when it comes to the Italian technocrat leader.

According to one account of last week's Spring European Summit where EU leaders dealt with economy policy the quality of discussion was "quite good".

(Considering that discussion is something that never previously featured in the March council, which was rather about EU leaders reading worthy pre-prepared statements of no-intent at each other - this is high praise indeed).

The debate was partly due to the fact that it was just a plain old summit with no crisis prefix. EU leaders could look a little further ahead rather than battling with imminent European disaster.

The other factor could reasonably be deemed the 'Monti effect' or how substituting one unserious person with a serious one changes the dynamics of a group.

Says one diplomat:

"It also plays a role that the composition of the European Council has changed, particularly that Monti has joined. For a very long time, during the Berlusconi years, Italy was absent at the level of the heads. Berlusconi would be telling jokes - but he never said anything of substance. I mean he was commenting on the food."

"But now Monti is there and he is very active and he has a lot of credibility. He contributes to the more forward atmosphere of the European Council - focusing on the underlying economic issues not just the immediate budgetary issues."

His presence on the European scene is one thing. He is good at exploiting it too. Two-times a commissioner, committed European, big country national, in favour of open further opening the internal market - all this allows him to fit in many camps.

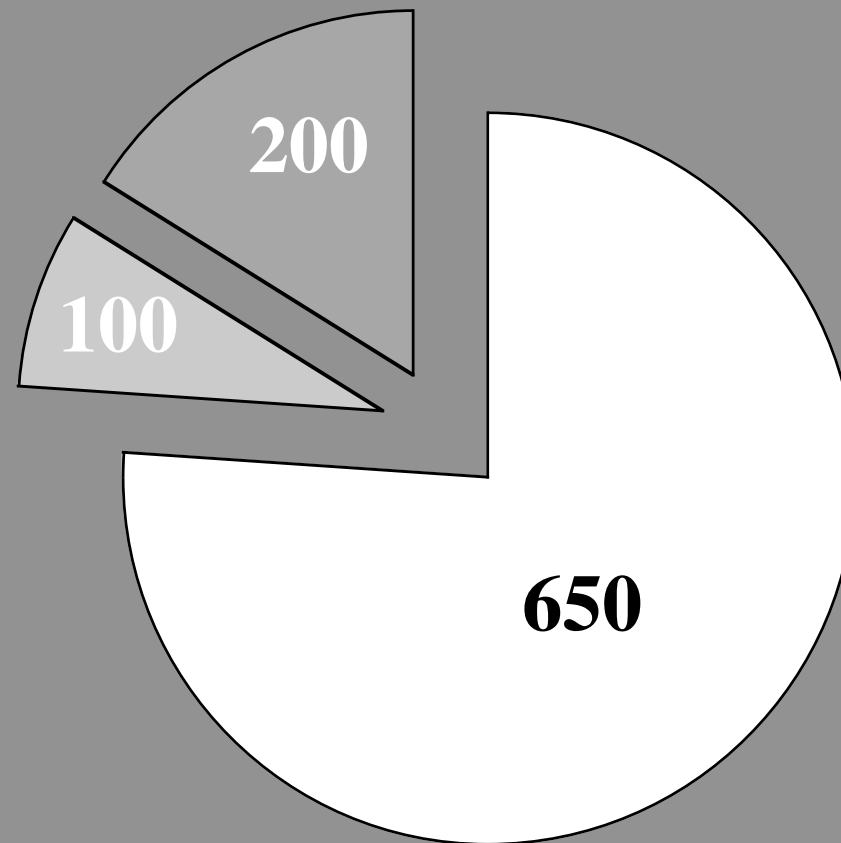


